



Every year the San Francisco Ocean Film Festival hosts a program for Bay Area middle and high school students, and beyond, featuring inspirational oceanthemed films from around the world. Students participate in live Q&A sessions with filmmakers and marine scientists after each screening. We also bring middle and high school film makers and their films to the stage to inspire the next generation of film makers.

This lively program will give participating students the opportunity to learn about tagging sharks in our own San Francisco Bay, how a woman with paraplegia surfs, and how you can take plastics found in the ocean and turned them into something useful: skateboards. Our hope is that our young audience leaves the event buzzing with a new awareness of why the ocean matters!





